GREG DENNING *INCOMING NATIONAL PRESIDENT*

National President Russell Anderson and the National Executive Committee warmly welcome Greg Denning as the Society's 78th National President.

Since 2013 Greg has been with independent powerhouse STUDIOCANAL, in the National

Sales & Acquisitions Manager role. In that role he acquired and distributed successful titles like *Knives Out, Unhinged, Hereditary, Ballerina* and *Mother's Day,* and initiated the STUDIOCANAL Cultivator Development Fund for local feature film development.

Before Studiocanal, he spent eleven years at Icon Film Distribution (since its inception), first as Sales Manager, and subsequently General Manager. In that period he oversaw the release of over 200 films theatrically, including *Bend It Like Beckham, Crash, The Queen, Slumdog Millionaire* and *Death At A Funeral*.

Before Icon, he spent 13 years with Hoyts Cinemas, in both Marketing and Programming roles.

He has also served as President of the Australian Independent Distributors Association and twice as Vice-President.

SANDRA ALEXANDER - 2021 NATIONAL CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR



SANDRA ALEXANDER 2021 National Cinema Pioneer of the Year

Sandra came to the screen industry from a background as a teacher and academic, where she pioneered a film study and film-making course in NSW high schools and made instructional videos for Macquarie University. She joined the Sydney Filmmakers Co-op and soon became a board member. Australian filmmaking was having its rambunctious revival. The Co-op supported much new talent, especially among women and indigenous filmmakers. With many late nights and lots of De Bortoli flagons, the Co-op screened and distributed early work from many of today's Cinema Pioneers – they will know who they are!

Sandra started in the industry full time in 1983. Her early feature credits were as a production assistant and Art Department Co-ordinator on films including The Year of Living Dangerously, Rebel and Undercover. As production manager she steered feature projects including Frauds, Soft Fruit, the feature documentary Tea With Madame Clos and as a line producer, Liquid Bridge, The Bet and September.

Her association with AFTRS was first as a student, and later as a lecturer there and at

other Australian and international training organisations. Throughout her career, Sandra has maintained a commitment to fostering and mentoring emerging talent in the film industry. Her other diverse activities included consulting to the federal and state screen agencies on budgets and incentives. She was co-ordinating editor of 2008 update of The Satchel - Production Management and Film Budgeting, the Australian industry's production bible.

During her four years as National Secretary/ Treasurer of Cinema Pioneers the Society achieved significant renewal in administration and communication and supported its members through a time of fire, flood and plague. Even earthquake!

Sandra adds "Membership of Cinema Pioneers has offered me much pleasure, new friends and stimulating experiences. I have been fortunate to work with two fine National Presidents, Tim Read and Russell Anderson, and State presidents. I'd also like to express sincere thanks to Sue Milliken for her advice and support throughout my career and especially with Cinema Pioneers."

Fiona works closely with filmmakers to share their stories with audiences on Australian cinema screens and has developed strong, long-lasting bonds with directors, producers and actors over the years working on Australian films, as well as championing the work of many first-time filmmakers as part of her company's ethos to nurture new talent.

Career highlights including working on David Michôd's feature debut, *Animal Kingdom*, alongside producer Liz Watts; Justin Kurzel's feature debut *Snowtown*; Mel Gibson's Academy Award-winning *Hacksaw Ridge*; Madman

Entertainment's box office record-breaking documentaries *That Sugar Film* (dir. Damon Gameau) and *Mountain* (dir. Jennifer Peedom); and powerhouse producers Bruna Papandrea and Jodi Matterson of Made Up Stories' feature films *The Dry* (dir. Robert Connolly), Penguin Bloom (dir. Glendyn Ivin), *The Nightingale* (dir. Jennifer Kent) and *Little Monsters* (dir. Abe Forsythe). Fiona has also developed and nurtured relationships with international filmmakers shooting big budget productions in Australia including Bill Mechanic (*Hacksaw Ridge*), Jodi Hildebrand and Will Gluck (*Peter Rabbit*) and Marvel/Disney (*Shang Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings and Thor: Love and Thunder*).

Fiona is a committee member of The Natalie Miller Fellowship, a not-for-profit organisation that was established to recognise, nurture and inspire the next generation of female leaders in the Australian screen community and was previously on the Board of Directors of TROPFEST, the world's largest short film festival.

Lorna Wallis has been an integral part of Wallis Cinemas history within various roles not only at locations, but in supporting her late husband Bob Wallis in continuing his father's legacy.

It all started when she was working for Doug Wilson as a bookkeeper where she met Hughie and Bob Wallis. From there her relationship with Bob flourished, leading to marriage and the beginning of her career with Wallis working at the Hi-Line Drive-In and Glenelg Cinema in the Candy Bar. It was during this time Lorna had her children, son Darryl followed by daughter Michelle. Lorna's fondest memory of working on the ground is at the Hi-Line where they would have up to 800 cars (per session) on a Saturday night and serve three course meals!

After the birth of her children, Lorna became the proud housewife to her dear Bob, always ensuring the house was in order, and that the children were involved in extra-curricular activities and that she was there to support Bob in his career.

Through the ups and downs, she was always by his side until the distressing passing of her beloved Bob. After his passing, she threw herself into the role of owner, navigating her way and leading the company (alongside daughter Michelle) after a challenging time. Other challenges to navigate have included evolving Cinema technology, the growth of streaming services and of course, the latest challenge of COVID-19. Now joined by Michelle's daughter Deanna, the three women are fiercely working hard to honour and protect both Hughie and Bob's hard work and legacy. The current Wallis Circuit consists of Mitcham / Mt Barker / Noarlunga / Mildura / Piccadilly and Gepps Cross Drive-In.

Lorna is extremely dedicated to her family and the business as she leads the way (with her support team) to ensure future success and longevity.

LARRY LANGFORD - 2021 QUEENSLAND CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR

Boy what a career!

In 1954, at the tender age of 14, Larry started work as a tray boy at the Royal Theatre Killarney, managed at the time by Norm Toyer. His duties selling eigarettes, Fantales, Minties and Jaffas in the interval saw him earn more in tips than the boss paid. Larry was also the poster boy. He would ride his bike around town sticking up the posters for the upcoming shows with his big pot of glue and trusty brush.

Norm Toyer's daughter was the ticket taker and took a bit of a shine to young Larry. She offered him the chance to move up to assistant ticket taker – a big promotion.

Larry moved on to the Savoy at Long Jetty for about a year where he was the ticket taker. While there, the projectionist showed Larry how to run the show. It was a win-win arrangement – the operator could have a night off and Larry learnt a new skill.


He then moved to the Erina Drive-In on the Central Coast where he worked on the gate and as the security guy. Larry made a big move to South Australia in 1967 to work for BHP at the Tandera Theatre in Whyalla as ticket taker, and security.

After a ten year stint there Larry packed his bags again and moved back to the Prince Edward Theatre at the Entrance where he was doorman and usher. Even in those early days the Prince Edward introduced the revolutionary concept of allocated seating.

Larry then got a job at the Moncrieff Theatre in Bundaberg run by the Bundaberg City Council. The new boss gave him the very flash title of Front of House Co-ordinator. The role involved ticket taking, ushering and advertising. Larry would stay in that role for 20 years.

Shortly after resigning, Larry needed to come to Brisbane for medical treatment and remembers the CEO of the Council tracking him down at the Royal Brisbane Hospital to offer him a job elsewhere in the Council because of all the very favourable comments he had received about Larry from theatre goers and others in the Council. Larry was thrilled at the offer but respectfully declined and went on to retire in 2006.

IAN HALE - 2021 WEST AUSTRALIAN CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR

Ian first commenced in the WA film industry in 1993 as a sales booker with United International Pictures (Paramount/Universal/DreamWorks/MGM). In 2003 UIP split, and Ian took on the role as WA/SA/NT State Manager for Paramount Pictures, with Paramount adding Transmission Films to their theatrical distribution slate in 2008

After Paramount decided to close their WA branch in 2013, Ian took a u-turn in his career when he was given the opportunity to go into partnership with The Backlot Cinema, opening the boutique 50 seat state of the art cinema to support the WA Film industry.

The Backlot integrated into its design facilities the ability for post-production for local film makers and with this innovation, Ian was able to follow his passion of supporting local filmmakers to bring their projects to life. In doing so, Ian worked as an Executive Producer on West Australian Feature Films, *Meal Tickets* and Screenwest funded *The Furnace* and came to the realisation many films that didn't have distribution deals or funding deserved a theatrical release in cinemas. To counterbalance this shortfall, in 2020 Ian launched his own theatrical distribution company in HALO Films.

Under this new banner Ian has served as an Executive Producer on feature films, *The Xrossing, Greenfield, The Last Horns of Africa.* Ian's latest project is Executive Producer on the big budget WW1 Film *Before Dawn* due for release in 2022.

This foresight has allowed these films to be seen on the big screen by the public and earn critical praise locally and internationally as well as establish box office revenue, helping in the ancillary sales of the films and giving them a presence in the market.

Since 2014, Ian has served as Chairman of the Board for the Revelation Perth International Film Festival and has assisted to bring the festival from small beginnings in 1997 to an internationally recognised alternative film festival of which he is very proud.

In addition to his work in the film industry, Ian is an avid supporter of local charity groups. For 20 years he volunteered for The Esther Foundation predominantly as a Basketball coach and mentor to young women, many of which have, under his guidance, had great success both on and off the court. In 2015 this selfless act saw Ian awarded the Rotary WA Volunteer of the Year Award.

In addition to this Ian has served as a Director on the WA Motion Picture Benevolent Fund for over 20 years, with his fondest memories of picking Arthur Stiles up from his home for the meetings in Fremantle, sharing the time together to discuss their mutual love of the film industry, Perth and original.

Ian still has many goals to achieve in the future in an industry he is proud to have served for nearly 30 years.

ROMA AND THE LATE EDDIE REVELL - 2021 VICTORIAN CINEMA PIONEERS OF THE YEAR



ROMA AND EDDIE REVELL

A life-time resident of Mansfield, Eddie was born on 7th August 1934.

Eddie's life-long love of cinema began early - as a youngster enjoying the serials on a Saturday night at the town's first Picture-Show, the local Returned Servicemen's Pictures in Highett St. The connection to cinema became even more firmly cemented when his grandfather Joshua Revell was one of three men who formed a syndicate to construct a new cinema "The Regent" which opened in September 1937. At an early age Eddie would be at the Regent to help an uncle light the kerosene-lit exit signs, but he actually preferred attending the opposition RSL Pictures as only they screened serials and gave out badges of famous Australian cricketers with each ticket purchased!

The Regent was sold to Doug Burns in 1948 and renamed the STAR THEATRE in 1949. In 1951 young Eddie was offered the job of ticket seller and within a year he had taken on the role of Trainee Projectionist. This also involved attending the 3-year course in Melbourne to obtain his full Projectionist licence - and work around the Burns Pictures cinema circuit which included venues at Seymour, Yea, Euroa, Alexandra and Eildon.

Eddie met his beautiful wife Roma at his brother's 21st Birthday party in October 1958 and the two were married one year later in October of 1959. They remained like "2 peas in a pod" - inseparable. The couple took over the lease and operation of the Star Theatre from April 1st 1967 and in 1968 they also took over the lease of the Holiday Theatre in nearby Eildon which they operated for 4 years.

The success in Mansfield was ongoing and Eddie and Roma purchased the freehold from Doug Burns in 1974 and continued to make many improvements to their beloved Star. The genuine, friendly and happy disposition of the couple endeared them to the locals and indeed all who ever met them. The two became as much a beloved local institution as the theatre they operated with such devotion.

A massive highlight for such a consummate showman occurred on 20th March 1982 with the hosting of the WORLD PREMIERE of the locally filmed movie *The Man from Snowy River* - a huge glittering gala affair which brought the entire town to a standstill. With 5000 people outside the cinema, Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser and wife Tammy led the stars of the film down the red carpet. For several weeks the movie screened non-stop as local movie-goers

were joined by busloads of tourists to watch the film in the cinema where it premiered. And of course history repeated itself when the Snowy River sequel graced the big screen of the Star Theatre in 1988.

Over the years, gala movie nights, fundraisers, luncheons, concerts, plays - all forms of entertainment and events were staged at the theatre. The Star was the genuine hub and heart of the community with the ever-gracious Eddie and Roma at the helm.

Along with upgrades and improvements the name was simplified to "Mansfield Cinema" in 1995. By June 1998 Eddie and Roma had clocked up 31 years of operating the theatre (an astonishing 44 all up for Eddie) so the business was sold to a local couple, allowing the Revells to enjoy retirement, including attending the annual Movie Convention in Queensland.

Sadly the lovely old theatre, so full of character and charm closed as a cinema in 2006.

Both Eddie and Roma's many years of service to the cinema industry were acknowledged when they became members of the Society of Australian Cinema Pioneers many years ago. They both enjoyed attending the many functions and activities of the Victorian Branch of the Society where they were held in high esteem. So high in fact, that late last year, the Victorian Committee had unanimously voted to select both Eddie and Roma as the first ever JOINT recipients of the "VICTORIAN CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR AWARD" for 2021. The decision is normally not made known to anyone until late in the year, but Eddie was advised of being chosen several months ago - so we are very thankful he knew of the forthcoming honour. He was delighted - but kept the news under his hat. When Covid restrictions allow, it will be our extreme honour to present the award to Roma.


After an ongoing battle with cancer, on 13th July, 2021 Eddie passed away quietly in Mansfield with his beloved and much adored wife, Roma holding his hand.

Mansfield has lost two icons - its THEATRE and the MAN who loved it...who loved to "put on a show" and entertain and make people happy - who gave generations of people marvellous memories.

SCOTT NEESON – 2021 CINEMA PIONEERS HUMANITARIAN AWARD RECIPIENT



SCOTT NEESON

In 2019 the Society of Australian Cinema Pioneers instituted a Humanitarian Award to recognise outstanding and exceptional service to the cinema industry and/or the wider community by a member of the Society. This service might be for charity work, mentoring, community service or any other activities of merit. The award is not necessarily made every year, and

only when there is an outstanding candidate. Previous recipients have been Murray Forrest and Tom Jeffrey.

This year's recipient of the Australian Cinema Pioneer Humanitarian Award is Cinema Pioneer Scott Neeson the Founder and Executive Director of Cambodian Children's Fund.

Scott was born in Edinburgh, Scotland. At age 5, he migrated to South Australia with his family. At the age of 16 Scott left high school and found employment with a local cinema chain, Clifford Theatres, which ran a number of Cinemas and Drive-ins in Adelaide.

He subsequently moved to Sydney working for GUO and then Hoyts. In 1987 he was appointed managing director of the joint distribution arm of Columbia Pictures, 20th Century Fox and Hoyts Distribution.

Scott accepted an offer to move to Los Angeles in 1993 to take up the role of Vice President of International Marketing with 20th Century Fox and ultimately as President of 20th Century Fox International.

During a vacation in South East Asia in 2003 Scott stopped over in Cambodia.

While there he visited the Phnom Penh sprawling municipal dump. Here met some of the hundreds of children and their families who lived and

scavenged on the tip. Deeply moved by their plight, on his return to the US he made plans to change their lives and circumstances.

In early 2004, using his own funds he established Cambodian Children's Fund and then in December 2004 he left Los Angeles and relocated permanently to Phnom Penh to manage the organisation.

"The Cambodian Children's Fund mission is to transform the country's most impoverished children into tomorrow's leaders, by delivering education, family support and community development programs into the heart of Cambodia's most impoverished communities".

In 2016, the Variety International Children's Fund named Scott as the recipient of its annual Humanitarian Award.

In 2007, Quincy Jones awarded CCF founder Scott Neeson the inaugural Harvard School of Public Health "Q Prize" in recognition of his "extraordinary leadership in advocacy for children" through CCF.

To quote the Dalai Lama: "He sacrificed his comfortable life in America, so he could spend more time in Cambodia with the poor people there".

SECRETARY/TREASURER'S REPORT

This year's report has been compiled jointly by Sandra Alexander and Ross Barnard. Sandra retired from the position of National Secretary/ Treasurer as of July 2021. She was invited to continue her links to the Society as a member of the National Executive Committee.

Ross was appointed as National Secretary/ Treasurer in July 2021. Ross has a long history in film exhibition – from programming screenings at Sydney University in the early 1970s, to working for the National Film Theatre of Australia, followed by seven years as Co-Proprietor of the Walker St Cinema in North Sydney, and more recently Administrator of the Sydney Film Festival from 1985 to 1999.

In their new roles Sandra and Ross continue to work closely together to further the aims and activities of the Society.

CONTRIBUTIONS AND MEMBER SUPPORT

Covid's massive disruption of the industry has continued in 2021, especially with the recurring lockdowns in NSW and Victoria, the States where we have the largest numbers of Cinema Pioneers. Cinema closures in those States profoundly affected both individual Cinema Pioneers members and severely reduced the capacity for our major corporate supporters to offer the level of assistance they had generously provided in the past.

The harsh effect on many cinemas resulted in their requiring patrons using the Cinema ID Card to make a small gold coin donation with every ticket issued to help exhibitors maintain their support for many charities. Our members understand the difficulties that face exhibitors and have graciously accepted this new policy. Some independent cinemas have not required a contribution, and we are grateful for their continuing support and understanding.

Covid's wide effects throughout the industry have resulted in many retrenchments and much unemployment. The impact on Cinema Pioneers has been a sharp drop in the number of new members joining the Society, and consequent loss of income from membership fees. As more hopeful times return, we expect that our membership numbers will gradually increase. If you are aware of a fellow long-term industry colleague who might qualify to join Cinema Pioneers, please urge them to refer to our website for full details of the criteria for membership.

The sudden decline in corporate contributions and new memberships created enormous financial pressure for the Society, and we reached out with an appeal to you, our members. Over 200 Pioneers responded to the appeal with varying amounts that have contributed significantly to the cost of running the Society. As our Trading Statement on page 11 reveals, without this support, 2021 would have seen the Society run at a loss for the year in excess of \$33,000. Your cheques and transfers were accompanied by many expressions of encouragement and appreciation. Heartiest thanks to all who assisted!
