I started my career some thirty years ago – my first job was Production Assistant on a furniture commercial – and my work experience encompasses a rare range of creative industry sectors, providing unique insight into production, investment, distribution, and exhibition.

I was a filmmaker for 20 years - making films and docos for a myriad of local and international companies including Discovery Channel, National Geographic, ABC, SBS and Film Australia - before undertaking leadership positions at the federal film agency, the Australian Film Commission (merged into Screen Australia in 2008), including Head of Development, where we invested in great screen stories by talented emerging Australian creatives.

In 2011, I became the Executive Director at the Motion Picture Distributors Association, a peak body representing the studio film distributors in Australia. My role here is to champion theatrical film distribution by articulating the value of cinema to related businesses, Government and the wider creative industry, and forging strategies to navigate changing consumer consumption behaviours, and proposed policy changes by Government that affect the dynamic distribution landscape.

I currently sit on several Boards and Committees, all committed to driving evolution, growth and sustainability in the Australian screen industry. I'm especially passionate about fostering diversity and gender equality in our industry. And of course, I'm a very proud and passionate Cinema Pioneer and thrilled to be taking on the role of President.

2023 NATIONAL CINEMA PIONEERS OF THE YEAR

ANDREW MACKIE and RICHARD PAYTEN



Richard Payten and Andrew Mackie have worked in the Australian and New Zealand film industry for the last thirty-five years as distributors, marketers, and producers - but always on the side of the independents.

Richard began his career at Chauvel Cinemas in 1987, working in publicity and marketing before joining Ronin Films as General Manager in 1988. At Ronin, he worked with Andrew Pike on numerous releases including STRICTLY BALLROOM, AN ANGEL AT MY TABLE, ORLANDO, NAKED and, together with Pike, secured the rights to SHINE.

Andrew Mackie joined Greater Union as an Assistant Film Programmer in 1987, working under John Politzer, Peter Cody and Peter Marrett. As a junior programmer of the Pitt Centre he championed, among other films, the release of Cameron Crowe's SAY ANYTHING. He then joined Ronin Films as a publicist where Payten and Mackie commenced an enduring long-term partnership that continues today.

In 1993 the pair founded start-up film distributor The Globe Film Co., initially handling publicity and marketing campaigns for clients including PolyGram, Becker Entertainment and Paramount on such films as TRAINSPOTTING, BEAN, TWO HANDS, FOUR WEDDINGS AND A FUNERAL and SPICE WORLD. They also founded their own distribution label, acquiring titles such as SECRETS AND LIES, DEAD MAN, LOST HIGHWAY, MULLET, PRAISE, THE TRACKER, UNDERGROUND and LOVE SERENADE and establishing a landmark output deal with major production company CiBy.

In 2001 Globe was acquired by distributor Becker Entertainment where the pair became Joint Managing Directors of the film division encompassing Becker and Dendy Films, where they acquired and released such films as THE MOTORCYCLE DIARIES, GOOD NIGHT AND GOOD LUCK, SUPER SIZE ME, STRANGE BEDFELLOWS, SWIMMING POOL, THE STORY OF THE WEEPING CAMEL, CONTROL, THE WORLD'S FASTEST INDIAN and many more. At Becker they also co-founded MovieMeasure, an audience research business that was the first of its kind testing Australian films in the local market.

In 2007 they formed independent distributor Transmission Films and co-founded Oscar-winning production company See-Saw Films in partnership with lain Canning and Emile Sherman. Oscar-winning See-Saw Films has produced such films as THE KING'S SPEECH, THE POWER OF THE DOG, SHAME, LION plus ground-breaking television series including SLOW HORSES, HEARTSTOPPER and THE TOP OF THE LAKE. Transmission was formed as a partnership with Paramount Pictures under Mike Selwyn, with a long and varied roster of releases that encompasses six Palme d'Or winners and 50 Academy Award nominations, including BROOKLYN, QUARTET, AN EDUCATION, LIVING, BOOK CLUB, CALVARY, CAROL, THE RAILWAY MAN, BOY, BENEATH HILL 60, DANGER CLOSE, THE GUARD, AMOUR, LOVE AND FRIENDSHIP, BLUE IS THE WARMEST COLOUR, SUFFRAGETTE, I AM WOMAN, TEA WITH THE DAMES, THEIR FINEST, VICEROY'S HOUSE, THE PAINTED VEIL and VOLVER in addition to LION and THE KING'S SPEECH.

During their careers Richard and Andrew have championed such Australian films as STRICTLY BALLROOM, SAMSON & DELILAH, RABBIT-PROOF FENCE, LOOK BOTH WAYS, HOLDING THE MAN, OYSTER FARMER, SHERPA, THE NIGHTINGALE and over fifty others, representing over 210 Australian Film Institute nominations. They have supported the first films and careers of local filmmakers such as Baz Luhrmann, Jane Campion, Neil Armfield, Warwick Thornton, David Caesar, Rachel Griffiths, John Curran, Julia Leigh, Jennifer Peedom, Shirley Barrett, Robert Connolly and the late Sarah Watt. As Executive Producers their credits include RIDE LIKE A GIRL, TRACKS, CANDY, MARY AND MAX, CHARLIE & BOOTS, OYSTER FARMER, THE EYE OF THE STORM and SIX MINUTES TO MIDNIGHT.

Payten served as a long-time consultant to the Australian International Movie Convention and acted as consultant to the Alliance Française to establish the French Film Festival in Australia.

Mackie has served on the boards of the Adelaide Film Festival and Screen Canberra and is a parttime author, having had his first novel THE TOUR published by Penguin in 2021.

CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR

JENNY NEIGHBOUR



In 1989, when Jenny Neighbour applied for the job of Senior Secretary/Assistant to the Director of the Sydney Film Festival, she was interviewed for the position by SFF Director Paul Byrnes and SFF Administrator Ross Barnard, who is now National Secretary/Treasurer of Cinema Pioneers.

Thirty four years later...

From the Sydney Film Festival's bio for Jenny Neighbour:

"Sydney Film Festival's International Documentary, Australian Documentaries, First Nations and many other programs, have benefited from Jenny Neighbour's expert curatorial eye for many years.

As Head of Programs, and Documentary Programmer for the annual Sydney Film Festival, Neighbour is responsible for bringing the very best of the best true stories to Sydney audiences from all over Australia, and around the world.

In 2019, her 30th year at the Festival, Neighbour was honoured with the Independent Spirit Award by the Australian Independent Distributors Association in recognition of her lifetime contribution to the industry. Since 2000, Neighbour has programmed 2,000+ documentaries, presenting crucial contemporary issues and thought-provoking works from across the globe, to an ever-broader Festival audience. In 2020, when Sydney Film Festival went virtual, and national, for the first time in its history, as a response to the pandemic, she secured the premier of 10 new Australian documentaries, in a program of 33 films and short films.

Jenny also takes the lead on the First Nations program and works with the Festival Director on the curation of Retrospective and special focus strands. She also manages the Festival's programming teams, working closely with the Film Advisory Panel and curators of the Freak Me Out, FLUX: ART + FILM, Family, Retrospectives and Screenability strands.

Each year Jenny sees the best films of international festivals (in person or online during the COVID era), including the Berlinale, Göteborg, IDFA, London, imagineNATIVE, in search of powerful stories for inclusion in the Festival program. She also meets with key industry figures including sales agents, producers and other content providers to promote the Festival and secure sensational new films for our annual event.

To ensure world-class presentation standards are upheld during the Festival, Neighbour liaises with the SFF Guest & Industry Manager to develop a multifaceted Guests and Talks Program.

Neighbour joined Sydney Film Festival in November 1989, at a time when the Festival comprised a small team with very limited resources. As such, her role as Assistant to Festival Director & CEO Paul Byrnes encompassed a huge cross section of responsibilities: from programming to guest coordination, design, copywriting and marketing.

She has worked alongside five SFF Directors: Paul Byrnes, Gayle Lake, Lynden Barber, Clare Stewart and (currently) Nashen Moodley.

After studying fine arts at Goldsmiths College, London, she worked with the Greater London Council in human resources and events, before moving to Australia. In Sydney she worked on touring bicentennial art exhibitions, as well as the Gold of the Pharaohs exhibition at the AGNSW.

Neighbour has been on the jury for AIDC and the Cork Film Festival, and in 2018 the AACTA Best Indie Film Grand Jury."

CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR

PHILLIP BRANFORD



Phillip (Phil) started as a third boy at the Port Elliot Institute in 1965 (while still at High School), then followed his cousin to the Port Elliot Drive In as an unpaid assistant during school holidays and some weekends. As he was doing a motor mechanic apprenticeship, he also kept in touch with the projection room via a church hall which had a pair of RCA Star of Star 35mm projectors.

After his apprenticeship ended in January 1971, Phil went to work for MGM Distribution for the last 6 months of its life, and during that time he obtained his South Australian Projectionist Licence. From there he was employed by Wallis Theatres at the Valleyline Drive In. In April 1976 Phil and his family packed up and moved to Queensland. While there he worked casually at the Toombul Cinema when it was a single screen, then was able to get a fulltime job at the Village Twin Cinema in New Farm.

For family reasons Phil returned to South Australia in mid 1977, working casually in a couple of cinemas until he commenced work at the Warner Theatre in the city which at the time was under the control of Freeman Brothers from the Fair Lady Theatre. Wallis Theatres took over the lease in June 1979 until the theatre's closure in February 1980.

From then Phil was primarily stationed at the Chelsea Cinema, but also worked at Glenelg and Academy until 1983. During this time at the Chelsea, he screened "The Rocky Horror Picture Show" every Friday night at 11.30 and occasionally had extra sessions where all 1,100 seats were full. Later in 1983 he was moved to the newly purchased Piccadilly Cinema North Adelaide staying there until April 1990, when he returned to the Chelsea until May 2007. From May 2007 until July 2013 (when I retired) Phil was based at the Wallis Mitcham Cinemas.

During his theatrical working life he has also worked at many other cinemas on a very casual basis - Hindmarsh Town Hall, Lockleys, Wakefield Street City, Classic, Trak, Randwick Odeon for 6 weeks in 1979. Phil also started servicing projection equipment in the early 90s with the Late Max Beck in mainly country locations - Lameroo, Roxby Downs, Leigh Creek, Whyalla, Port Pirie, Mount Gambier, Bordertown, Victor Harbor, Moonta, Renmark, Port Lincoln and Lobethal, and performing new installs in some of those locations.

Even though Phil has officially retired from the industry, he continues to keep an association with it through doing digital work for Big Screen Advertising Adelaide, volunteering for some independent SA cinemas and is a committee member for S.A. Cinema Pioneers. Phil says "It has been a great time, met some and worked with some wonderful people, and I would do it all over again".

Congratulations Phillip Branford and thank you for your outstanding contribution to the Australian Cinema Industry, our 2023 South Australian Cinema Pioneer of the Year.

Leigh writes...

"My wonderful life in the Qld Film Industry.

After leaving school, I applied as a film repairer at CIC in Ann street in 1979. Not knowing anything about films I went upstairs and was greeted by Joy Strange. She said the boss won't be long as he was on the phone.

An hour later Manny Coe introduced himself and I had my interview. I received the call that I was successful and could I start on Monday. When I arrived, Eric Seed the Despatch Manager showed me around and introduced me to Vic Forsyth and Rob Gibson, then took me upstairs to meet the Head Booker Terry Sullivan, BCC Booker Gordon Harding, Country Booker Bob Black and Bev in the accounts.

I thought 'no one gets replaced here as they are all over 50' (ancient!)

Eric taught me Projection on the old Junior Standard Projectors we had in the Theatrette, which I thoroughly enjoyed.

Despatch for me was short lived. Before the end of the year I was asked to move upstairs to replace Bev who looked after accounts and Payroll. Memories of coming back to the office every Thursday with pockets full of cash was scary, as I did not want to carry a money bag!

After 3 years Gordon retired and I became the new Country booker, booking in Westerns as supports and scheduling a print on a long circuit between cinemas. You would not see the film back in the vault for months. Before long I was made Head Booker and saw new technology replacing trunk calls, telex and fax machines.

With the breakup of UIP I became the Qld Branch Manager of Paramount until they closed the Branch in late 2013. I thought it was a great time for a change, however I was approached by exhibitors to program films for them, so I started my own company in 2014 and now have twelve cinemas to look after nationally.

Now 44 years have passed and I don't know where the years have gone, however I still feel privileged to be a part of the film industry."

Movies have always been in my blood. My Mum worked as a teen for Arthur & Rene Stiles at The Cygnet, as did my Aunty and my Uncle (in fact they met at work).

As a child I remember lining up at City cinemas with my brother in school holidays for the latest Disney animation or us going to The Cygnet with Mum for the best Choc-tops around and the latest release.

I first started in the Perth Entertainment industry in Human Resources for TVW7. I had previously been at Bunnings Head Office and during my time there had learnt the new computing practices and had taken myself to TAFE to learn coding, writing programs. I think that's what landed me the role at Channel 7, as part of my role was as a payroll assistant and inputting all the timesheets on their new Computer system and then writing the software for the salaried staff yearly reviews. At that time City Theatres were under TVW7 and coincidentally I was administrating the salaries of the Stiles family!!

In 1984 I married Martin, and we have had a wonderful marriage ever since. 1986 after the birth of my daughter I became a casual employee at TVW and did relief work where needed in different departments.

In late 1990 after Christopher Skase had bought the station, 80+ staff were retrenched including all casuals. I was lucky enough to have one of the TVW Sales Reps put my name forward for a 10 hour a week role at Hoyts Fox Columbia TriStar Films as an admin assistant. I got the job and started work on Jan 8, 1991 working with John Papadopoulis.

The 10 hours quickly became 24 hours a week with so much to do. I learnt all the aspects of distribution on the job – sales and booking, distribution practices, getting to know all the WA exhibitors, doing triplicate accounts works. Then learning about publicity, dealing with the local media, keeping reviewers happy and of course creating and executing film promotion.

In 1994 the joint venture split and I accepted a full-time role with Columbia TriStar to become State Manager with John going to Victoria to head up the role there. Soon after that the company became branded Sony Pictures - I've been with them ever since.

During my time with Sony, we've had many great titles, inspiring leadership and an awesome team of staffers, who are my second family. And I've met many wonderful people through the industry – distribution, exhibiton and media - many of whom I now consider to be close friends.

Some of my favourite memories are the planning and executing the many fabulous film premieres at Hoyts Cinema City:

- Police abseilers scaling down the front façade for the release of CLIFFHANGER, including search lights that set off alarms at the airport!
- Filling the entire wire 'space' framing upstairs with red, white and blue balloons and a costumed themed launch of THE PATRIOT.
- Filling balloons for MIRACLE ON 34TH STREET upstairs at Cinema City and running them around the streets of the Xmas Pageant being and being mobbed by kids
- Creating a fantastic charity family day out event for 3000 people for the release of STUART LITTLE at the new Reading Belmont, all in the aid of Telethon.

In addition to my time with Sony Pictures, I was a committee member on the now defunct Cinema Industry Insurance fund. I also have the privilege of being an honorary Director with the Western Australian Motion Picture Benevolent Fund and have served in that role for 20+ years. I have also been a committee member for the Cinema Pioneers of WA, and Secretary/Treasurer for the last 8 years. Additionally, alongside good industry friends in the late 90s, I organised 'Movie Balls' to bring back that nostalgia to our local workers.

Away from work, I have maintained my love of giving back to communities and charities. I was Secretary and then Administration Manager for the Gosnells Cricket Club for 8 years. During this time, I was awarded the WACA Club Administrator of the Year award. I played top level Netball for many years and took on the role of secretary of our club and fitness coach of the teams. I then became a state badged umpire for the association and coached teams for 10 years on and off.

Every year for the past 26 years our family and neighbours decorate our houses with Christmas Lights in Consulate Court Thornlie. I have facilitated Charity collections for the past 15 years, running the publicity angles and the social media page to promote them. We have raised over \$100,000 for many charities.

For 10 years I volunteered with Anglicare WA on the organising committee for the Op Shop Ball. I then volunteered with Brightwater WA helping launch and manage Perth's Longest Lunch fundraiser and most recently with Asthma WA with the same program.

I have been very fortunate to have such a great career with Sony Pictures for the past 32 years and have made some life-long friends. I am very grateful for the support of my husband and children which allows me to complete my Sony role to the best of my ability.

Being a part of the WA Cinema Industry is an absolute joy and a job I enjoy every single day.

CINEMA PIONEER OF THE YEAR

TOM SCHOUTEN



I first entered the exhibition industry by default in 1960 when my family moved into the manager's residence at the Plaza Theatre in Geelong. Though mainly live theatre, we did screen Greek movies on a Sunday night in those early days. Then along came the Leyland Brothers who showcased their Australian adventures to local schools during the day and the general public at night. They were just starting off and struggling, sleeping in our dressing rooms at night to save costs.

I commenced with Village Roadshow on January 24th, 1973, by managing their new Twin Cinema Complex in Geelong working alongside the wonderful Geoff Heriot, Village's Area Manager. The

values Geoff taught me then, have stayed with me for my entire working life and are proudly adhered to in my current cinema operation.

During my ten years there, I also managed the Corio Theatre and did manager holiday relief at both of the Geelong Drive-In Theatres. As the youngest manager on the circuit, I was asked to manage the Hamilton Drive-In for four months whilst the site manager recuperated from a heart operation. I remember well turning the town upside down and causing major traffic jams with the screening of THE TOWERING INFERNO.

During the ten years in Geelong, I oversaw major cinema releases which included marketing large budget campaigns. When JAWS (1975) and E.T. THE EXTRA-TERRESTRIAL (1983) were released at the Forum Theatre in Melbourne, The Corio Theatre was the only other Victorian site to screen them day and date. As manager, I was able to deliver Village Roadshow record box office revenue at each release.

One of my strongest memories with E.T. was converting the Corio Theatre's 'Çrying' room into a hospital ward so a terminally ill patient could view the movie with her family. The lady passed away a few days later but a simple act of kindness gave that family lifelong memories. I call that the power of cinema.

My favourite promotion whilst in Geelong was for Robert Morley's WHO IS KILLING THE GREAT CHEFS OF EUROPE? with the main prize being dinner for one at the Lido in Paris. The winner was to fly to Paris, have a meal and fly back the next morning!

In 1983, Village Roadshow invited me to join the Melbourne Circuit. Locations I managed included Greensborough, Boronia (1985), Croydon, Knox, The Village City Centre, Doncaster, Dandenong and Knox Multiplexes.

My first Melbourne cinema was a joint venture between Village and Hoyts. I was joined at that year's Movie Ball, on our first date by a girl from Hoyts. A month later I proposed, and the rest is history. As a result, with Cynthia and her sister Lisa being Personal Assistants to Graeme Hodges the Southern Regional GM and Leon Fink, the Hoyts Chairman respectively, Village deemed it wise to remove me from being so close to the enemy and transferred me to the Boronia Twin. Whilst there, I was awarded Village Roadshow's Manager of the Year, for 1985.

In 1998, whilst managing Doncaster Cinemas, I introduced the daily multi session policy, giving patrons a choice of up to five daily sessions, instead of the usual Saturday, Sunday, and Wednesday matinee sessions. This was taken up nationally by our partners at Greater Union and our opposition, Hoyts Cinemas.

1999 whilst based at Dandenong, I introduced the first non-smoking policy for any cinema foyer in Australia. With the release of BATMAN RETURNS, I converted the shopping centre into Gotham City and even had the local newspaper change its banner to the Gotham City Journal for the month of release.

That same year Village asked me to join their Multiplex marketing team, which oversaw all promotional activities for the new multiplex cinemas across Melbourne and Sydney. This role required me to report personally to the Vice President of Warner Bros based in Los Angeles.

My greatest joy has been returning to Boronia in 2005 and setting up Metro Cinemas Boronia, as a totally family-owned operation. My daughter Ellie has the role of General Manager and I enjoy the ongoing support of both Cynthia and Lisa in administration and front-of-house. My son Kristian helps greatly in hunting for the inevitable roof leaks and other technical issues when he isn't wearing his Emergency Services hat.

Most in this industry gravitate to the art of running film but my strength and love has always been maintaining strong relationships with our patrons, often greeting them by name when they arrive at the location to enjoy their movie experience.

I often refer to our cinema as 'The Smallest Show on Earth' but we are far more than that. The years of operation have been difficult working on shoe-string budgets and the Covid years nearly broke us. However, Covid brought us even closer together and we managed to get through the pandemic by the skin of our teeth. Whilst not out of the woods, we continue to fight to secure our little cinema.

I do also enjoy the great relationships built with other exhibitors and our distributor partners, but whilst there are many joys in being in Exhibition, it does come at a price. All those shifts worked at the expense of family gatherings. Missing out on those special occasions whilst the children are growing up puts great pressure on family life. I am so thankful that Cynthia has put up with me for so long and given me the support and continued respect, especially at the low times that we experience in this game.

I would also like to thank the Victorian Committee of Cinema Pioneers for my most unexpected nomination for this year's Victorian award.

I also serve as a Councilor on the CIBF and Sub Committee Scholarship fund, supporting the education of the children of cinema employees.

SECRETARY/TREASURER'S REPORT

The Society remains in a reasonably healthy state financially, with a total equity in the national and branch accounts of \$144,056 (2022 - \$137,314)

Significant factors contributing to the financial result for the year were:

- 1. Exactly 100 new members joined the Society this year, up from only 48 the previous financial year.
- 2. After a gap of three years due to Covid, the 89th Anniversary Dinner in November 2022 resulted in an attendance of 150 members and guests, and with additional support from many industry companies and individuals, ran at a small profit for the Society.
- 3. Although no new merchandise was produced during the year, the sale of our pins and caps continued, with each sale generating welcome income. Stock levels of both items remain healthy.
- 4. The introduction of a new-look membership card in February 2023 has proven very popular with our members, with more than 400 purchased up to June 30th, and sales continuing strongly into the new financial year. These will remain available indefinitely, and both versions of the photo ID card will continue to be recognised by cinemas.
- 5. In 2022, Branches resumed holding functions, and in a post-Covid world, have all found that venue and catering costs have risen significantly. All Branches incurred an overall loss in their reserves due to having to subsidise the cost of functions to keep the price for members at a reasonable level. A decision of the National Executive to distribute some funds to the branches proportionate to the size of their membership was made at the July 2023 NEC AGM.
- 6. All the Society's initiatives combined to allow the Society to run at a surplus of \$6,742 for the year, after incurring a trading loss of \$14,739 last year, a very welcome turnaround of \$21,481.

WHAT IS THE MPIBS? www.mpibs.org.au

It is quite different from Australian Cinema Pioneers. It's a registered charity offering taxdeductibility for donations, and is the Cinema Industry's primary benevolent society. Founded in 1931 by people working in the motion picture industry, the Society provides financial and emotional support to currently employed, or retired, members of our industry – exhibition, distribution, production or post-production – who have fallen on difficult times and have a genuine need.

WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?

The Society relies on donations from industry enterprises and individuals, particularly those who make regular yearly donations. However, as generous as these contributions are, the current level of annual donations needs to increase in order to meet the continuing call on the Society's funds.

WHAT IS THE LEVEL OF SUPPORT PROVIDED BY THE MPIBS?

There is no set yardstick or formulae. It all depends on the circumstances of each individual. In addition to individual needs, the MPIBS provides annual "Winter Comfort" and "Christmas Cheer" payments to beneficiaries.

HOW DOES THE SOCIETY ASSESS AND SUPPORT BENEFICIARIES?

Assessments are undertaken in the strictest confidence by the MPIBS Chairman of Investigation & Relief, who recommends to the MPIBS Council a level of support appropriate to the particular needs of the individual. Financial assistance only supplements government pensions, and may include a quarterly subsidy for utilities and provide 'in kind' support by way of essential medical aids, such as wheel chairs or breathing apparatus, heaters or Vital Call alert buttons.

HOW LONG DOES THE ASSISTANCE LAST?

For as long as is needed. Beneficiaries are reviewed carefully and confidentially every 18 months to 2 years to ensure that there has not been any significant change to their circumstances. Depending on how they are going, their relief payments can be increased, decreased or left at existing levels.

There are other State-based Cinema Industry Benevolent Funds which may operate differently to the MPIBS – contact your State Branch President to enquire and support.
